September 2013 Financial Details

Income	\$10,815	\$51,049
Expenses	\$15,414	\$45,032

Income for the month was \$10,815 against expenses of \$15,414 giving us a loss for the month of \$4,598. We are still a little over \$6,000 in the black for the year. Monthly pledge payments have not picked up as we moved into fall. At this time a year ago we were ahead \$7,700 for the fiscal. Quarterly giving statements went out recently which may prompt some people to send in pledge payments. The only notable extraordinary expense was for telephone service due to two months' worth of bills hitting in the same month.

Status Report on Painting Project: The project is complete. Most of the bills have been submitted and the total project cost is \$1,772. That's slightly above the minimum budget estimate. More time was spent doing tuck pointing of the masonry and less time was spent on painting.

<u>President's Note:</u> <u>Through Sarah's Spectacles</u>

When the late Rev. Angus MacLean was a farm boy in Nova Scotia, his father sent him up from the root cellar to check on the wind. Turn so "the wind sings in both your ears," he told the boy. "Then tell me where your nose points to."

To me, this two-part process describes what we do at Reeb: listen closely to hear the wind that sings in our ears, and then look in the direction that wind points our noses. We are different from a social club (although our relationships matter deeply) or a social service agency (although we strive to promote love and justice). The term "faith formation" came up recently in our appreciative inquiry training. I think Rev. MacLean's father's instructions offer a pretty good model for faith formation.

"Faith formation . . . implies that we are continually developing faith in our relationships, in ourselves, in our religion, and in hope that the world, our existence has a positive meaning," says one UUA website.

Estimate of Exterior Lighting Improvements: We

have an estimate from Midwest Electric, which did the work on our building during the remodeling, to improve the exterior lighting on the building. There are several options including replacing the security lights on the Fourth St. side of the building and over the alley way in the rear, installing new fixtures in the overhang along the front of the building, and installing a dusk to dawn light over the office door on Fourth St. If we did all of them the cost would be around \$2,500. During our brief discussion there seemed to be a consensus that we could probably get by with the light over the office door and the improved lighting in the front. It's possible the existing light over the back driveway may only need a new bulb. The two items mentioned above would cost around \$1.700.

Disposition of Endowment Contribution: Before the end of the year we will be receiving a \$10,000 anonymous contribution intended to start a permanent endowment for JRUUC. Establishing the terms of the endowment fund will take a longer time than is available. To put the money to work while that process is underway, the Finance Committee approved a motion to deposit the money in an account under JRUUC's name with the UUA's Common Endowment Fund.

Budget Adjustments for MOSES Directory

Listing: The committee also approved a motion to transfer fifty dollars from the advertising budget and \$25 from the social justice budget to pay for a directory listing with MOSES.

An Update from MOSES

JRUUC is a congregational member of MOSES – an interfaith coalition working to increase justice in our state. From four angles we are working to decrease the Wisconsin prison population, via:

- 1. Sentencing reform, like when/if 17 year olds are charged as adults
- 2. Reforming in-prison experiences, like solitary confinement, compassionate release, and rules for "old-time" prisoners
- 3. Post-release reform, like changing the use around Consolidated Court Automation Programs (CCAP), and increasing "ban-thebox" efforts
- 4. Increasing funding for Treatment and Diversion (TAD) programs

Natural Burial: A Gift to Your Family and to the Planet

Join the PJS for a special presentation about natural burial. Kevin W. Corrado, the coordinator for Natural Path Sanctuary (NPS), a nature preserve burial ground located at the Linda and Gene Farley Center for Peace, Justice & Sustainability just outside of Verona, will explain the common characteristics of a natural burial. More and more individuals are making prearrangements to ensure that their wishes for a natural burial are known and respected and to ease the burden of making critical decisions at a time of emotional stress.

Kevin will provide information about burial methods and about the Wisconsin advance directive entitled "Authorization for Final Disposition." He will also share stories of how families have honored the deceased family member's desire to be part of the natural cycle of life. Many people appreciate the beauty, the simplicity, and the healing power of nature. The renewed interest in natural burials is an encouraging example of rediscovering the wisdom of our elders.

Presenter: Kevin W. Corrado, LCSW, LCS, a retired hospital social worker, may be Dane County's first natural cemeterian. As a former board member of the Trust for Natural Legacies and as the coordinator for Natural Path Sanctuary, he is a passionate advocate and an enthusiastic educator for natural burials.

Stewardship Stirrings

The UUA's FORTH (Forward Through The Ages) stewardship development program helps JRUUC to incorporate year-round aspects of stewardship into all aspects of our congregation's culture. The Thanksgiving season provides us with the opportunity to reflect on how we give thanks, *and also* how we can become **gracious receivers**.

Why is receiving graciously so important? Laurel Amabile, from the UUA states, "We learn the value of giving first by our experiences of receiving." Babies and toddlers are great gracious receivers; the joy and pleasure on my daughter's face is a clear expression of her appreciation when we clap & cheer for her when she uses a new word.

So what changes as we become adults? Why do we become dismissive after a compliment ("Oh, it's no big deal," or "I really didn't do much, Chris did all the work,") or feel guilt when a gift is received ("I should have gotten them something," or "How do I repay them?")?

The FORTH program suggests that congregations reflect and discuss together how we can graciously receive. The thought is this: If we are able to receive graciously and be filled with a sense of abundance, then we can also learn to be generous with our own giving of time, talent, and treasure -- not out of guilt or obligation but because **receiving these gifts in our own lives fills us with abundance** and affirms that **we have a spiritual need to share with others.**

So, for the past few months I have been experimenting with graciously receiving. Instead of feeling guilt over not being part of the "Many Hands" painting crew, I am choosing to say, "Thank you Mark Lydon (and others!) for sharing your time & talent to make our community more beautiful." Pretty simple really, once I think about it. When I can receive graciously, it *does* allow me to share my own gifts with a sense of spirit and fun that is so much more fulfilling than when I've given out of a sense of guilt or obligation.

Maybe I'm not the only one who struggles with this shift. Let's share our stories this season: How have *you* received graciously lately? --Beth Esser

Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) Board of Trustees Report of the October 17-20, 2013 Meeting

A New Beginning and a New Covenant

Building on many years of challenging and effective work by previous boards, the newly constituted Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) board gathered in Boston for its first formal meeting. The anticipated agility and other benefits of a smaller board were evident from the start. The meeting began with an extended check-in allowing both trustees and staff to get to know each other better and continue to develop the common commitment and mutual respect begun at the September retreat. With able facilitation by Unitarian Universalist Ministers Association (UUMA) President, the Rev. Linda Olson Peebles, the board engaged the history and theology of covenant and then considered and approved a set of promises we are making to each other and to the UUA.

We promise to:

- Show up with our best selves, intent on listening with openness and willingness to the voices in the room and those that are not.
- Speak with an authentic voice, grounded in our lived experience, mindful of differing cultural interpretations and realities that are present.
- Honor our duty to do the work of the board and to place anti-racism, anti-oppression, and multicultural accountability at the center of that work.
- Recognize that each of us is fully human, with hurts and vulnerability, and the need to laugh and sing!

The opening hours of the meeting and the depth of conversation about the meaning of the promises we made moved us into the business agenda with clarity and good humor.
