Third, effective leaders empower others. Strive never to do anything alone that you could do with somebody else. If you stopped your current activity at Reeb, are there others who know how to do it? If not, train someone! Leadership at JRUUC is strong and we can keep making it stronger.

November 2013 Financial Details

Some of you may remember an earlier column, probably written early last summer, in which I noted that for the first time in more than a few years, JRUUC had passed through the closing months of the budget year without my having to do cash flow calculations to make sure we had the money to pay the bills through the start of the new budget year. In fact, we finished 2012-13 with a surplus and brought in more gifts than usual through September.

For the month of November, we had \$12,662 in income against expenses of \$12,705 for a net loss of about \$43 for the month. However \$4,300 of that income came from the Reeb Rave which is a one-time event for the year. At the beginning of December, our year-to-date budget surplus was only \$916.

Why did this happen? There are several reasons. Expenses are running around seven percent above what we expected when we drew up the budget. Some of that is due to increased utility costs. On the income side, rentals are down by over 70 percent of budget. Some of that is due to major renters who went elsewhere because of Big Oak's temporary use of the building. It should be noted that the income from Big Oak is well above the budgeted amount, but is reserved for capital and other special expenses approved by the Board of Trustees.

The financial reports for December are not complete yet, but we do know that our income is over \$25,500 for the month, almost twice the November total. Thanks to all those who paid off their pledges and made end of the year gifts, we are again in good shape! Halfway through the year, we have a surplus of about \$3,000. Exact numbers will be in our next newsletter.

Stewardship Stirrings

We just finished celebrating our congregation's twenty years of existence and are looking forward to a very bright future. This is an excellent time to consider stewardship beyond fundraising, supporting Reeb for the long haul rather than the year ahead.

The Unitarian Universalist Association has determined that an important component of the long-term well-being of any congregation is a **reserve** of funds that ensures financial stability. If large enough, its interest can also provide support for special social projects. The UUA considers this **endowment fund** or **planned giving fund** one of the pillars necessary for the congregation's long-term health. Until recently, Reeb has never had such a fund, but a wonderful anonymous donor has started one by a donation that will serve as seed money for our endowment.

In the long term, the endowment fund should be financed by such unexpected gifts through which donors support the long-term health of Reeb. If the congregation approves, the fund will be administered by a committee established through an Enabling Resolution that will provide details. Significant gifts might well arise from legacies of congregants. We will keep you informed of emerging plans on this subject, but meanwhile, let us celebrate what a generous congregant has donated to get us started.
