## In The Interim

I remember that first flight as if it was happening right now. I had flown many times on commercial flights but never like this. This airplane, you see, had only one engine, only one propeller, only four seats and only two, at least seemingly to me, very, very tiny wheels. More importantly I was about to put not only myself but also my then 11-year-old son Noah inside of it as it took off and flew. I was more than a bit scared and whole lot excited. I had no idea what it would be like. We taxied towards the runway and as the engine revved up I told the voice inside myself saying, “are you crazy!” to be quiet. This was happening. Then we headed down the runway and slowly took flight. It was amazing. I could see everything, trees, houses even people. There was a peacefulness and calm about it that I had not expected. Thus, began my love of general aviation and flying in small planes.

Over the next several years I would put in many hours of flight in the right seat of that little red and white Cessna 172. I would learn so many things including that there is a whole world out there of small and sometimes tiny little airports and landing strips. That you can actually fly across the country hopping from one small airport to another. That by flying south in early spring you can see spring arrive in just one day as the colors of green, and white and pink grow stronger with each hour. That landing on bumpy grass airstrips can give you multiple landings in one. I also learned that if you open a can of soda while taking off and you hit an air pocket the contents of the can will rise up and momentarily become airborne – until it all lands in your lap.

Most of all I learned, from that very first flight, that I could do things that were scary and that I never thought I would ever do. I learned to trust and have confidence in someone else. In many ways that first flight brought me to where I am here today with all of you. It was a big step in the journey.

There were of course a couple of key elements that made it possible. First, and probably most

importantly, I had absolute trust and confidence in the pilot of that plane. That trust included knowing that the plane itself was always maintained in top-notch condition with the most up to date avionics. I knew we had a full tank of fuel that would allow us to reach our next destination.

These are important, necessary, things to have when you take flight – whether you are in a small plane or a congregation preparing to take flight into its future.

This month as JRUUC plans to provide the fuel for what is your next flight remember these things: you can do scary things you never thought you could do, you have to trust and have confidence in the pilot or pilots, you will discover whole worlds you never knew were there, you will reach your destination and it will become a part of the journey, and also remember to never open the soda can on take-off!

**Sarah on Stewardship**

All this year we’ve been laying the foundation for an exciting future, thanks to your commitments of time, talent, and treasure. With Reeb’s Annual Budget Drive kick-off dinner coming up on Saturday, March 8, many of you have been thinking about how you want to invest in this congregation next year. I’d like to put that question in the context of our shared values, vision, and commitments.

Core values of love, justice, and the interdependent web underlie the vision emerging from our

Appreciative Inquiry process. A few lines from the provocative statements from our AI workshop in January, listed under “Interim Ministry” on the jruuc.org website: “Our building and grounds are simple, beautiful and well maintained.” “Many of our members participate in inter-faith organizing efforts.” “We utilize the resources and leadership development opportunities presented by the UUA at all levels.” “Our financial stewardship is strong, consistent, and sustainable.”

At last May’s annual meeting, this congregation made commitments grounded in our values. Prizing justice and affirming our part in something larger than ourselves, we voted to move toward fair compensation for our staff, dues to MOSES for interfaith work against over-incarceration, and annual increases toward fair share participation in the Unitarian Universalist Association and our MidAmerica Region. Last fall the board also committed us to a competitive salary package for our next settled minister.

These are goals that will stretch us. They put our values and vision into action. I know that we can achieve them. After all, isn’t stretching exactly what we do when we spread our wings to take flight?

## January 2014 Financial Details

	January	July 2013 to the present
<b>Income</b>	\$10,420	\$105,856
<b>Expenses</b>	\$13,932	\$99,564

Income for the month of January was \$10,420 against expenses of \$13,932. The congregation had a monthly deficit of \$3,512 although we still have a \$6,200 surplus for the fiscal year to date. Income for the month of February should come in at around \$10,000 based on contributions to date plus recent average Sunday collections. Rev. Marlene expressed concern about references to “burning our reserves” in a recent Treasurer’s newsletter article. She says her review of pledge reports indicates there are still a number of pledges yet to be paid, so we are currently financially sound.

Update on snow removal: snow removal cost over \$400 in January and February will probably see expenses of more than that.

Hiring of cleaning person: the committee discussed hiring of a new cleaning person. It appears we will have to make that person an employee since we will provide the equipment and want the job completed a certain way. Elizabeth Barrett will be the supervisor. Being an employee means that we must pay half of her FICA. There will also be some costs for purchase of a better vacuum cleaner and supplies. The total cost should be about what we have already budgeted.

Bathroom remodeling: we will update the gender neutral toilet. Fixtures (new and used) should cost around \$150. Most of the other supplies are already on hand.

While anyone can attend both Regional Assembly and General Assembly and participate in workshops and special events and mingle with UUs from all over the region and world, only delegates from congregations are allowed to vote and to speak on the floor of the plenary/business sessions. Being a delegate is a

wonderful way to learn about how our association and congregations work and to be a part of making the actual decisions that set the direction of our association. Imagine being in a room with a couple thousand or more UUs to discuss important issues and social justice commitments that are at the heart of UUism and voting on them.

There are also exciting programs for children and youth so GA is a wonderful way for families to experience Unitarian Universalism together. Youth may participate in Youth Caucus while at GA and youth who are delegates also can vote.

If you are interested in being a GA delegate and cannot attend or travel to Providence, it is possible to attend online and be an offsite delegate as well.

**Announcement: The UUA Brand Story**

The Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) is making changes—changes to where we do our work, how we do our work, and how we tell the story of our Unitarian Universalist movement to the wider world.

The dramatic shifts in today’s religious landscape demanded that UUA leadership take an in-depth look at our strategic communications and how

effectively our voice is breaking through the competing noise of our high-tech society. We examined our core values, our unique personality as a faith, and the impact Unitarian Universalists hope to make in the world. We asked UUs from across the country, of all ages with various levels of involvement in our faith, to answer three questions: **Who are we? What do we do? And why it matters?** From these conversations, and more, we began to form our brand identity for the future of our religious movement.

We engaged a top-notch branding agency to help us synthesize this information and explore ways to tell our story with more clarity and effectiveness. This is important for each of us, and it’s crucial in our efforts to reach out to others who share our values. Today, I am excited to share with you one of the tools in an ongoing process of improved communication strategies, the Unitarian Universalist Association’s new logo.

Our new logo, for many, will be the first introduction to who we are. It’s meant to entice a person to learn more. And it’s doing just that. Our random testing groups of UUs and non-UUs described emotions and images evoked by this logo with words such as brave, enlightening, warm, spiritual, energizing, having integrity, welcoming and determined. Our logo is the first innovation among many that the UUA plans to implement to better tell our story. Learn more about this process.

You will be seeing this new logo, and more components of our brand identity, being implemented across all UUA communication channels over the next few months. And many of these changes will be featured at our General Assembly in Providence, RI, this June.

We look forward to conversations with you, in congregations, districts, regions, and affiliated organizations, about your own brand identity and how it fits into the new direction of the UUA.
