From the Minister

Happy New Year! I hope your holidays were full of wonder, joy, peace – whatever you needed.

I'm glad to be back after traveling home to spend holiday time with our families. And I'm looking forward to all the blessings – and challenges – that this year will bring for me and for us. I'll be going to a UU ministers' conference in February, to learn about active hope in the face of climate change from Joanna Macy and the Movement Generation. In March, I'm going to Selma and New Orleans to deepen my work as a white ally. The trip to Selma will be to mark the 50th anniversary of the Selma Voting Rights Campaign; New Orleans is the location for this year's Allies for Racial Equity conference, where we'll learn about environmental justice through workshops and field trips. I'm also looking forward to our Regional Assembly in April, which I'm hoping many of you will attend with me. And I'm eagerly anticipating being ordained by this congregation, and being installed as your minister!

I'm really pleased with our journey together so far, and I'm looking forward to our continued relationship and community-building. I'm working with our Board of Trustees to create a structure for our ministry and governance; and I'm working with other Reebers to create a pastoral/parish care system and to collaborate on planning and creating worship. You'll hear more about these efforts over the next few months – take me up on invitations to attend Listening Sessions; watch for information on new Chalice Circles that will be forming; and respond to a congregational survey that will help us discover our talents and what we're able to share with each other.

Look, too, for opportunities that our Peace, Justice, and Sustainability Group and I will create, to help us deepen our understanding of what it means to be a congregation named after a white minister martyred in the Civil Rights Movement. Those of us who are going to Selma would like to share the preparation and the experience with you. And

there's a lot going on right here in Madison that calls us into solidarity with our neighbors of color. I look forward to figuring out where I can use my power and privilege to fight the inequities I'm learning about in my new home town, because my faith calls me to making our world safe and fair. The members of James Reeb Unitarian Universalist Congregation's Board of Trustees have been taking account, balancing numbers, evaluating what we've been doing and making many plans for 2015 and beyond. We are looking forward to a BOT workshop in January where we'll work on our covenant with and between the minister as well as defining our Vision Statement and Mission.

Our Annual Budget Drive will begin in the next few months. We'll be exploring the application for an additional Chalice Lighters Grant to assist us as we hire a new DRE and a new Choir/Music Director as well as paying fair share wages for all of our paid staff.

We are planning for our minister Karen's Ordination/Installation Service and the celebration lunch that will follow. We'll be hosting out of town guests, providing support as they visit our congregation and Madison. Of course, we are also preparing for our May Congregational Meeting.

Financial Update

	November	Year to date
Income	\$21,897	\$70,484
Expenses	\$10,012	\$66,238

Income for November was \$21,897 which appears to be the strongest for that month in the history of the congregation. Some of that is due to the income from the Rave which is \$846 over budget. There will be some expenses but we still should be above budget even after those are taken out of the total income. Some of the money comes from advance payment of pledges. That often happens as the end of the tax year approaches. Last year's December income totaled over \$24,000.

Expenses for November were \$10,012 which is low. There didn't appear to be any anomalies with the major line items for the month so it may just be a drop in incidental expenses. We are now ahead for the fiscal year which is about where we should be according to the budget.

The finance committee discussed capital items which might come up in the future. Among the items mentioned are the repaving of the parking lot behind the building to improve drainage, replacement of the two furnaces for the lobby, classroom and office areas and replacement of the roof over the same areas. The furnaces are working fine but are over 20 years old. The roof is also in good shape with minor repairs done following last winter's ice problems. However it is at the end of its warranty period and we need to be aware of that fact.


