From the Minister

Love is one of the grounding concepts in my theology. My understanding of God is as the energy that arises within and between us, and love is one of the best words I know to describe how that energy feels when we are fully engaged with it. Love fills us as it moves through us, in ways that range from personal to pastoral to prophetic.

One of the ways that love manifests in our lives is through taking care of each other, and this congregation has several ways to do that. This past month, I've found myself in deep gratitude for the opportunity to facilitate your giving and receiving through the Minister's Discretionary Fund. The Fund is set up through a line item in our annual budget, and I use the money in it to help our members and friends in times of financial hardship. I encourage anyone who could use help to talk with me about what they need – and I encourage those who can to consider making a donation. We took a special collection on Christmas Eve that doubled the Fund's capacity, and I've also received a private contribution toward it. It is a blessing to be able to say yes to people in our community when they need help.

Justice work is another way that love manifests in our lives; Dr. Cornell West has said that "justice is what love looks like in public." This offers us another frame in which to continue our conversations about race and equity. March 11 marks the 50th anniversary of James Reeb's death, and it's in this context that we'll be talking about his work as an ally in the fight for economic and racial justice.

And, on a personal level, I continue to be grateful to be your minister. I am learning to love this community for your depth of heart, your radical welcome, and your commitment to justice. And I hold deep appreciation for the trust you are showing me, and for your continued openness to walking together in faith and love. Thank you.

I want to clarify the following sentence from my

The Board of Trustees (BOT) provides Authority, Accountability and Guidance to non-BOT groups, who will then decide the "how we do things" which may or may not be written out in procedures or guidelines or policies. The BOT follows the guidelines of JRUUC's Bylaws.

I hope you all are feeling the love here at James Reeb! We all come with our own set of beliefs and rules about how to move through this world. We come with expectations, dreams, and needs. Often, these are layered with pain and wounds. And collectively, we make a conscious decision to join this Beloved Community as part of our journey, bringing all those things with us.

We are learning the dance of relationship here. How do we live our truth and honor another's truth? How do we make room for someone who doesn't agree with us? How do we reconcile when conflict happens?

I have been touched by discussions I have been part of when we gather either on a Sunday or for other Sacred Work. This idea of a higher power comes up when we talk about why we are working together for this community. You may call this God or Universe or Love or dozens of other concepts and ideas.

What I am learning is that when two or more people come together, whatever that higher power is, it is most alive when we are in relationship together. It calls us to be our best selves. It calls us to walk into our fears. It calls us to embrace others. It calls us to be vulnerable, show up and choose compassion and kindness. It calls us to choose love. Can you hear the calling?

Financial Update

Income	December \$23,191	Year to date \$93,675			
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Expenses	\$10,944	\$77,182			

Income for the last two months of 2014 was exceptionally strong. We would have set all-time records in both months save for December of 2008 when there were contributions to the capital drive for the remodeling in addition to regular contributions. Total December income was \$23,191 against expenses of \$10,944. We have a \$16,492 surplus for the year to date. We currently have \$55,883 in outstanding pledges. Assuming those all are paid we should be in good shape through the end of the fiscal.

Rental Income: Rental income is about 25 percent below budget but should be on target once UW Continuing Studies in Music pays their bill. We have been renting to more groups holding classes such as Tai Chi and now drumming.

Budget Adjustments: The addition of line items for the Ordination Ceremony and Operating Reserve have been added to our 2014-14 budget per the BOT's request. We are able to do this because of an anticipated surplus.

Consider again this Provocative Statement which was gleaned from our Appreciative Inquiry process for our future as a congregation: "Our financial stewardship is strong, consistent, and sustainable."

We are busy these cold winter days planning the Annual Budget Drive (ABD), which is one opportunity to make that statement a reality! This month we work with Rev. Karen to train Visiting Stewards. Visiting Stewards will contact as many members of the congregation as we can to hear your stories and give you an opportunity to commit to a financial pledge at a level that fits into your budget and helps the Board of Trustees create a JRUUC Operating Budget that reflects our values and visions.

The annual budget drive kicks off on March 1st after the worship service, with lunch and a program not to be missed! Following the kick-off event, a Visiting Steward will invite you to meet for a one-on-one conversation. If you are not contacted by a Visiting Steward by March 15, and would like a visit, please let either of us know.

People give to JRUUC for a range of reasons. Tell your Visiting Steward what those are! Do you want an extended family of people you trust to help raise your children with values you believe in? The Stewardship Team recently noticed that the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) has updated its recommended contribution guide for individual congregants, also known as the Suggested Fair Share Giving Guide. The **new guide** looks like this:

- the new guide is based on a monthly income rather than an annual income
- the new guide does *not* include incomes over \$15K/month (\$180K/year)
- the new guide *increases* the starting % of fair share giving for certain income levels


