### **President's Column**

### A Quaker Experience

I recently attended a Quaker-style service, which included queries, the clerk's testimony, and a time of worshipful silence. Though I knew about the Quakers, this was the first time I had ever participated in one of their services or meetings. It was both moving and educational.

#### **Format**

The queries were three questions the clerk asked us to consider. The clerk's testimony was like a pastoral thought, providing his "answer" to the queries. Then, we entered the time of worshipful silence, where we could ponder our responses to the queries within ourselves or stand and share with the assembled group. We were asked to view the statements as God speaking through us, to avoid responding to others' statements when we spoke, and to allow for time in between each person's statement. The clerk said possibly no one would feel moved to speak, and that would be okay, too.

#### **Expectations Blown**

I wasn't sure what to expect, but quietly guessed that very few participants, if any, would speak. I assumed that the largely Christian, mostly middleaged and older people there would not feel comfortable with standing and speaking as the voice of God through them. I was very wrong. Someone stood up pretty early into the time of worshipful silence before being followed by a slow, steady stream of statements after that. I am guessing about eight people in this gathering of approximately 50 spoke.

The clerk had asked that speakers keep in mind that, unlike prayer, our words should be statements/opinions/thoughts, not requests and supplication. He said that rather than us speaking *to* God, this was to be God speaking *through* us. While some still prayed to God, some speakers really did make statements—about forgiveness, humility, simplicity. In between statements, we sat in shared awareness. I felt completely calm and unhurried, able to sit with my thoughts and digest what people were saying.

#### **A Call to Simplicity**

The clerk's testimony was about simplicity—that in our complicated world of technology and multitasking, commercialism and drive for success, it is important that we all take time each day to pause and reconnect with ourselves, with nature, with God who is in all things.

It was a little hard for me to hear so much capitol-G God language, and is equally hard to write it so much here. But, if I remind myself that this is just one word to describe what I consider to be "love" and "life force," and what others consider to be "spirit" or another concept/image, then it feels more comfortable and appropriate.

#### Just What I Needed

I was so glad to have attended this Quaker-style service. It provided me some time of quiet and calm, much needed after a hectic week with extended family. It offered me good reminders about slowing down and paying attention. And, it exposed me to a style of worship I had not experienced before.

I hope to someday have an opportunity to lead a Quaker-style service at JRUUC. I hope you'll attend. In the meantime, let this be a reminder to you to slow down, to pay attention, and to take time each day to reconnect with the divine within yourself and our world.

While this reflects a negative cash flow for the month, we finished the 2014-15 fiscal year on a strong note. After transferring the restricted ministerial discretionary income and the amount we already decided to carry forward into 2015-16, we have a surplus of \$5,618.69. Congratulations JRUUC members and friends!

As many of you know, we discovered July 20<sup>th</sup> that we have a 2015-16 budget deficit of over \$8,000. The Executive Team and I are considering the options moving forward. Communication will be ongoing.

Line of Credit: JRUUC has renewed its emergency line of credit with Park Bank. This money will be available to us if needed should we incur a major unplanned expense in the coming year. The interest rate for this line of credit has been lowered from last year's 5.5% to 5.25%.

Refinancing Commercial Real Estate Loan: The finance committee is waiting to hear back from Park Bank on the possibility of refinancing our loan for the building to get a lower interest rate.

July was my first month serving as JRUUC treasurer. A big thank you to Art Hackett, Elizabeth Barrett, and Marla McFadden for helping to orient me to the position. I look forward to serving in this role for the next two years.
