I'm writing this in Portland, Oregon, where it was 95 degrees today. This reminded me of my time in Kentucky, where I learned several ways to adjust to the heat. The first was to force myself to go outside so I could acclimate. The second was to search for streams or pools while out hiking, and dip my head down into the water and then straighten up, letting the water run from my hair down my body, giving me sweet relief. The third was the art of sauntering – slowing down drastically so that it took less energy to move, and so generated less heat. It was hard to saunter, at first. But my natural pace just didn't work in this climate, and so, with practice, I learned to appreciate slower movement. I found myself automatically moving into a saunter when leaving the convention center today.

Sometimes we can change the situation we're in to make things more comfortable. And sometimes we have to learn how to deal with the discomfort, because it's not going away, and we can't leave it. We can find ways to acclimate, we can find resources to help us deal with it, and we can make changes in ourselves that make it easier to be there.

Our lives together are like this. One of the key characteristics of the liberal religious tradition is the understanding that revelation is not sealed – new ways of understanding arise with every experience, every reading and interpretation of sacred texts, every discovery about how the world works. We move. Sometimes that movement is toward an external goal, like our racial justice work in Madison – and sometimes it's internal, like a change in understanding of who or how we can be together. Often, they go together.

During this summer, may we remember that it takes movement to realize our hopes and dreams.

President's Column

Postcard from General Assembly

Last month, six JRUUC members, Rev. Karen and daughter Catherine, and our office administrator attended the annual meeting of the Unitarian Universalist Association. General Assembly convened in Portland, OR this year, and was very well attended. The estimate was close to 4000

attendees – nearly 300 of them being youth and young adults. UUA President Peter Morales said these numbers give him hope for the future of our denomination.

Having had the good fortune to have attended “GA” once before, I went into this year’s with many hopes and aspirations for my time in sessions, worship, and conversation with fellow UUs from around the country and the world. I was not disappointed. I left Portland with my heart overflowing and my mind swirling with all of the inspiration and ideas I soaked up there. I also came away with more questions than I had come with — more challenges before me than I had expected — both as a UU, as an incoming congregational president, and as a citizen of this country and world.

Here is a sampling from the notes I took — quotes from leaders of workshops, lectures and worship services — that I thought you might want to ponder in your heart as well:

- A young woman said that having been raised UU, she spent her childhood wrapped in a warm blanket of loving, authentic, and inclusive interactions in her congregation. She felt once she came of age, she no longer had that warm blanket and advises congregations to find ways to continue those feelings children and youth have into young adulthood in order to keep this population coming back.
- It is okay for allies working for social justice to make mistakes, as long as they are aware of the difference between intention and impact — just because we have good intentions does not mean the impact is positive. Check this out and apologize and own mistakes with humility.
- The best actions to choose when selecting climate justice projects are those that have economic, social, and environmental impact.
- Faith is not a statement, it is a practice. And a practice is not just a feel-good experience, but a struggle, too. We need to dive in.
- Don't ask how many people of color are in your congregation — ask “How much damage can our congregation do to white supremacy?” White people need to stop feeling guilty and start feeling enraged,

because they, too, are victims of the supremacy system. We all need to be liberated.

- It takes the financial resources of eight Millennials or Gen-Xers to replace the giving power of one Baby Boomer.
- Many liberal Christian churches have begun offering creedless services or even church-wide mission statements in order to attract the growing population of people who do not identify as having any religious affiliation. Therefore, we need to find ways beyond our creedlessness to attract new people to our UU congregations.

On a more personal note, there were moments that were so moving and powerful, I wept. As Catherine and I were marching in the banner parade, carrying the JRUUC banner high, a man rushed up to me and told me he was with James Reeb the night he died. I ran into former Madisonian Diana Vezmar-Bailey and was able to tell her all that I have learned and contributed as a member of Reeb, all because she told me about Unitarian Universalism at her kitchen table one night many years ago. Sarah Hallas and I tearfully walked onto the stage in front of a cheering crowd of UUs as UUA President Morales congratulated us on the decision by the Supreme Court to make marriage legal for same-sex couples in all 50 states. The massive hall was filled with our voices joined in singing "Standing on the Side of Love." Later that day, I was moved and awed as I watched with dozens of other UUs while President Obama eulogized the Rev. Pinkney of the Charlotte, SC AME Baptist Church. What a week! What great energy and love all around.

I look forward to bringing that love and energy and inspiration to the year ahead as president of your Board of Trustees.

Financial Update

	May	Year to date
Income	\$10,470	\$152,402
Expenses	\$14,272	\$138,549

Income for the month of May was \$10,470 against expenses of \$14,272 for negative cash flow of \$3,802. The added expenses were related to Rev. Karen's Ordination-Installation. The Board approved increasing the budget for that by \$1,200 to \$4,200.

Surplus: None the less, we are \$13,853 in the black as of the year to date although the end of year surplus will be less than that. The board recommended shifting \$2,000 to the Money Market Account. That will be reflected as a debit on next month's treasurer's report although it will remain an asset on the balance sheet.

Pledge payments: Elizabeth has reviewed the pledge accounts and most people have paid them in full. There should be little additional pledge income this month other than the direct deposits.

Minister's Life and Disability Insurance: We overpaid the UUA for this at the beginning of the year because Rev. Marlene's new church sent in a payment at the same time we did. We have been drawing down the credit the UUA gave us over the course of the year and will start seeing those expenses on a regular basis a few months from now once the credit is exhausted. The activity was all within the same fiscal year so there was no impact on the bottom line but it is a potential cash flow issue. It was suggested that if this happens in the future the credit should be shown on the balance sheet.

Loans with Park Bank: The committee reviewed the mechanics of renewing the line of credit with Park Bank and exploring refinancing the mortgage at the same time since there's a possibility of obtaining a lower interest rate. There was a consensus at the meeting that this was worth checking into since the \$300 fee for the refinancing would likely be less than money saved over the remainder of the mortgage.

Children's Religious Education

The RE Committee recently finished a busy spring semester, offering 16 weekly sessions to three groups including at least 59 different children. This spring we covered topics from three UUA curricula: *Wonderful Welcome* (Pre-k to grade 1), *Moral Tales* (Grades 2-5), and *Amazing Grace* (Grade 6 and up). In addition, Grant Dobbe and Laura Yin led the first half of the OWL program for our 7th through 9th graders. (OWL will resume in the fall.)

Each Sunday that RE classes are in session at least seven teachers and assistants (plus a coordinator) staff the program. The Committee is deeply grateful to the 31 (at least) people who generously gave of their time to help our children expand their moral and religious understanding:

Adije Podebradsky, Jill Barasch, Cynthia Rudd, Anna Rue, Charlie McNulty, Beth Esser, and Derek Peterson, together with other parents of infants and toddlers, kept our nursery welcoming and safe. Mary Schaper, Shaili Pfeiffer, Peggy Haack, Noelle Livingston, Jessica Romick, Jocie Luglio, and Megan Barry worked with the Pre-K-1 group. Sarah and Steve Elmore, Stephanie Thurow, Erik Saynisch, Laura Ragland, and Dan Reain taught the grades 2-5 children.

Andy Soth, Grant Dobbe, Jerry Sullivan, Pam and Jim Younger, and Alex Zimmerman helped our youth group create a new space.

Larry Orr, John Koch, Alice Shuman-Johnson, Tom Kemble, and Susan Podebradsky stood ready to help as subs as needed.

Summer RE will offer 11 topics from *Keepers of the Earth*, a curriculum featuring Native American culture and environmental stewardship. Our teachers and assistants are "guest stars" from the congregation, trying their hand at teaching and talking about the subjects that they are drawn to. In mid-July we will gratefully welcome back our Director of Religious Education, Sara Goodman, who will work twelve hours per week. Meanwhile, the RE Committee is seeking people interested in teaching or assisting in our classrooms next fall or becoming members of our committee. There's room for YOU!
