I'm very excited to begin our second year of ministry together! I'm especially excited that we'll be starting it more fully staffed. We've increased Office Administrator Elizabeth Barrett's hours to half-time and hired Director of Religious Education Sara Goodman and Music Director Heather Yonker. These causes for excitement might also remind us of some concern, as a large portion of our budget is spent on staffing, and we've found an error that puts our budget in deficit. I hope you'll remember the energy and momentum we've been experiencing, and respond to the challenge of our unexpected need with whatever generosity you can offer during our September appeal. Paul and I have chosen to increase our pledge over giving a one-time contribution.

I'm looking forward to building on that energy and momentum. I'm very pleased that this year will include several programs and ideas that have grown out of the conversations we had last year. We'll begin a new small group ministry program called Covenant Groups. These groups, like the Chalice Circles this congregation once supported, will meet to reflect on monthly themes. The themes will also be the basis for our worship topics, and for some of our religious education offerings for children and adults. The goal of this structure is to provide opportunities to delve more deeply into topics that are important to us.

Speaking of themes, I'm grateful that the Children's RE Program has chosen the theme of equity for the year. This is a very timely topic in Madison and in the wider world. I look forward to exploring theological, pastoral, historical, and prophetic aspects of equity in worship and small group adult settings, as well as with our children.

Last year was a time of starting to make connections between us, and I look forward to getting to know more of you and deepening our relationships. Expect a phone call or an email from me, sometime this year, to ask when and where we can meet for a conversation. I'll be starting with

people I haven't had much contact with yet. You might also notice a change in my office hours – I will have lunch at the Daisy Café on Thursdays and will buy you a cup of coffee (or whatever beverage you prefer) if you meet me there for a chat!

May we continue to bless each other and the world we live in!

President's Column

Budget Appeal

As many of you know, JRUUC passed a balanced budget at the congregational meeting in May. Then in July, a household discovered that they had written their monthly pledge erroneously high. In order to close the gap between the budget we thought we had and the budget we actually have, the Board of Trustees (BOT) will hold a one-week appeal between Wednesday, September 9 and Wednesday, September 16. Following the ingathering service on Sunday, September 13, congregants will be asked to increase their monthly pledge or give a one-time additional amount toward the gap, which is \$8280.

Emergency Fund

To be clear, we do have \$5618 left over from last year's budget, but that is due to one-time occurrences, rather than the kind of funds we can count on seeing again. That amount has been designated by the BOT and Finance Committee as an emergency fund to be used in the event of an unforeseen expense (such as a building repair). Even if we were to use that amount toward the \$8280 budget gap, we would still have a deficit of \$2662.

Taking the Long View

At the August board meeting, it was recognized that JRUUC will need the same amount of money in pledges next year as we thought we had with the erroneous pledge in order to even stay flat financially for the 2016–17 year. Therefore, it was agreed that the appeal should be toward raising the full \$8280, since that is the operating budget we are working with, the majority of which goes to fair share pay of our staff.

Appeal Options

The appeal will ask congregants to choose to either increase their monthly pledge (by, perhaps, \$11 per month) or give a one-time donation (of, say, \$100). It is the BOT's desire in doing so to prevent wiping out the congregation's emergency fund and start financially behind for next year's budget drive.

The good news is, we are not experiencing a financial crisis, and we are making this adjustment early in the church year. As a Congregation of Great Strength, I know that we can each give just a little more and be even stronger together.

Financial Update

Thanks to a pledger paying their entire yearly pledge in July, as well as some prepaid pledges coming onto the books, our July showed a positive cash flow for the first month of our new fiscal year. The 2014-2015 budget surplus of \$5,619 has been transferred into our money market account emergency fund.

Park Bank offered us the chance to refinance the term loan on our building from 6% to 5.5%. Our monthly payments to the bank will not change, but the percentage of our payments going towards paying down our principle has increased. When the interest rates are reconfigured in 2019 we will have saved approximately \$4000 on the balance of our loan.

What a conversation to have in front of a newcomer. Visiting other churches can be a good way to get ideas of what not to do as well as best practices.

Fall Retreat Workshops

GongSong Meditation, Reflection & Workshop, Heather Poyner: Journey within during an amazing journey of deep meditation through the transcendent harmonics of sound. Rhythm facilitator Heather Poyner will be your tour guide as she plays a 26" inch symphonic gong. Following an hour of music (give or take — we'll be on village time!), participants can journal — write draw, doodle — their experiences to share with the group should they choose. There will also be time for discussion of the gong as an instrument for spiritual journeying as well as a sharing of its playing techniques. Workshop attendees should bring yoga mats, blankets, pillows and a journal. Other supplies will be provided.

Zentangles, Nicole Nichols: Zentangles are miniature pieces of unplanned, abstract, black and white art created through a very specific Method from an ensemble of simple, structured patterns called tangles on a 3.5-inch (89 mm) square paper tile. Zentangles are not only exquisitely beautiful, they are fun and relaxing to create. The process of creating a Zentangle is a form of "artistic meditation" as one becomes completely engrossed in making each pattern, deliberately focusing on "one stroke at a time" ®. The creativity options and pattern combinations are boundless. And anyone can do it!

Belly dancing, Mikhaila Scoville Durante: Connect with your "inner Goddess." No matter your age, experience or body type you will have fun with this experience. Mikhaila will discuss the history of belly dance and then teach the individual movements of the dance followed up with learning a short 'mini' combination so everyone feels they have learned a dance.
