Thank you, thank you, thank you! Our "Bridge the Budget Gap" appeal was hugely successful, raising over \$2,000 more than we needed to close the gap. I'm grateful to our Board and our Stewardship Team, who helped plan and execute the appeal – and to all of you for your generosity. I'm relieved that we can continue on into the church year on solid financial footing. And I'm excited to be looking forward!

I'm pleased to announce our monthly themes for this year, which were chosen through a collaborative process by me, Sara Goodman, and a group of congregational leaders. They are: Identity (October), Belonging (November), Freedom (December), Courage (January), Anger (February), Balance (March), Awakening (April), Justice (May), and Healing (June). You'll hear different perspectives on the themes in worship each week, and have the chance to learn a related "Hymn of the Month" each week. You'll also have chances to reflect on them in Covenant Group meetings, some of our RE experiences, and other meetings and events through the year. If you're a Youth (grades 6 and up), you're invited to attend worship the first Sunday of every month, and meet with me afterward to discuss the service and tell me what you'd like to hear at next month's first Sunday service.

And all Youth and adults are invited to a series of conversations about the Black Lives Matter Movement, as we consider hanging a large BLM banner on the outside of our building, and as we realize our need to talk through how we might respond to the Movement and how we feel about it. Please look for announcements about these sessions in your weekly "News and Announcements" email from Elizabeth. I'm grateful for all the time and energy you all have spent, and will spend, on these and other ways in which we build connection and community.

Making the already consistent efforts of these three and others into a recognized committee will help people know who to come to with questions or concerns and will empower them to make decisions.

"We expect our duties to include making sure that the kitchen is minimally equipped, consumables are replaced, laundry is done, the compost is dealt with, the counters are cleared, the refrigerator is clean, and accumulated stuff is taken care of," said Cindy.

## **Financial Update**

	August	Fiscal year to date
Income	\$11,472	\$32,199
Expenses	\$13,650	\$28,181

Our expenses exceeded our income for the month of August, showing a negative cash flow of \$2,178. We are still about \$5,000 in the black for the year due to our July contributions.

September brought a very successful budget gap appeal which will rectify the shortfall in our current budget. \$10,864 was raised! The appeal exceeded our shortfall by \$2,584. This money has been transferred to our reserve fund to be used for unexpected expenses as they arise. Thanks to all who contributed to the financial health of our congregation.

We again have a balanced 2015-16 budget of \$173,247 with expected pledge contributions of \$145,860. This is the budget approved at the May congregational meeting.



#### **Chalice Lighters: We Light This Flame**

Every Sunday, we respond to the lighting of our chalice at JRUUC by proclaiming the power of the light before us. It nurtures and sustains the light within us. Our inner light is strengthened by our flaming chalice. Our worship services are one way to get an infusion of that glow.

The MidAmerica Region of the UUA is making that infusion a very practical thing. Their program, the Chalice Lighter program, has a mission to extend UU principles and faith by promoting growth of our congregations. This program funds congregational initiatives that: enlarge or improve building space or buy property; increase professional staff; implement publicity or public relations outreach programs or start new congregations. In fact, JRUUC will be submitting a proposal later this fall to strengthen our staff support.

The funds to support these initiatives come from people who decide to help extend the UU principles and faith. Three times a year, those folks, Chalice Lighters, receive a letter describing the initiatives that were chosen to receive a grant and a "call" to send in a contribution. At this point, JRUUC has 35 Chalice Lighters. That impressive number only goes to prove how generous and committed we are! We not only want to nurture and sustain ourselves, but seek to spread our principles and faith.

Please join us! Think about whether this is a mission you are interested in. On November 8th we will be asking you to become a Chalice Lighter and help spread our faith. For now, enjoy the warmth of the flame!
