As someone who finds the sacred in our relationships, I really appreciated the respect and curiosity you showed during these conversations, for each other and for the work of the Movement. I'm excited that so many of you are eager to hang the sign – and I hope you'll talk with me if you haven't had a chance to be part of one of the conversations. I'm now looking through antiracism curricula and training opportunities, and I plan to offer the first set of adult religious education sessions after the winter holidays.

I'm also thankful for the opportunities I'm having for training and collegial connection. I've been away a lot this fall, and am grateful to be serving a congregation in which there's support for the minister's growth and learning, and understanding that what's good for my professional development is good for the congregation. As I write this, I'm in Minneapolis for the first of a series of three seminars on congregation-based spiritual direction, which I'm hoping will inform our new covenant groups.

I hope that you, too, get to experience the gift of gratitude among all the things you find yourself feeling this season.



JRUUC is a congregational member of MOSES -- an interfaith coalition working to increase justice in our state. From numerous angles we are working to decrease the Wisconsin prison population -- and push for change on other issues, like Drivers' Cards for undocumented workers in Wisconsin.

Monthly meetings usually happen on the first Saturday of the month, from 10 am - 12 noon. The next one is **November 7** at First Unitarian Society.

"ROC Wisconsin: Restoring Our Communities – Beyond 11x15" will kick-off Tuesday November 3 beginning at 9:30 am at Bethel Lutheran Church (312 Wisconsin Ave). This will inaugurate the new phase of our criminal justice reform campaign. We will continue to work on the same nuts and bolts areas (e.g. TAD funding, Solitary Confinement, Old Law Parole, Crimeless Revocations, etc.). But, it will be done with an eye on the larger picture we strive for, which includes these main aims:

- For Wisconsin to invest in the programs and strategies that will end the racial and economic disparities that fuel mass incarceration
- For Wisconsin to reduce it prison population to 11,000, and to reduce the number of people on extended supervision
- For Wisconsinites to view people who have been convicted of a crime as human beings and members of families.
- For formerly-incarcerated people to be restored to full participation in our communities, our economy and our civic life.
