What a joy it was to celebrate the first day of Spring with you, and to have considered together the many ways in which we approach balance. We kicked off our annual budget drive, and talked about balancing the joys and wonders of our time on this Earth with the concerns and sorrows we feel around some of our human actions and interactions. We'll move along in our conversation this month with the theme of Awakening, and consider both spiritual and practical understandings of the process of awakening. I'm especially looking forward to hearing from our Youth Group on this theme.

One of the questions this theme brings to mind is that of our faith development. The topic of adult religious exploration came up in some cottage meetings last month, as an area in which Reebers would like to see more focus, and I want you to know I hear this desire. Now that the Caring Tree and Covenant Groups have been established, the more pressing need of pastoral care is being addressed, and so I now have more to devote to expanding our adult religious exploration opportunities. I'm offering "The Shared Pulpit" this spring to respond to the desires I've heard for deeper conversation and faith development, as well as the need for training for Worship Leaders, and I'm looking forward to offering it again next year for the folks I had to put on a waiting list. I plan to offer more adult RE next fall, and am working on creating a statement of purpose for that program. I'll be holding a couple of congregational conversations in the process, where I'd like for us to explore what you'd like to get out of adult RE programming, and what has worked for you in past offerings. Please watch your weekly emails from Elizabeth about these conversations. I'm also consulting with the newly created anti-racism core team about next steps for programming in the area of racial justice.

President's Column

Operating Budget Committee and Process

Thanks to Kim Reain, last year's Board President, we have a process in place for creating a draft operating budget to present to for a vote at the Congregational Meeting in May. Here is how it came to be and what it looks like....

When Kim was President-Elect, under Sarah Cook, she learned that the draft budget was traditionally drawn up by the Board President then reviewed by the Board. Knowing that she was not comfortable enough with numbers and budget figuring, Kim started to wonder how she was going to create the draft budget when her turn came.

Operating Budget Task Force

Kim proposed that a task force be formed to draw up a budget process to use each year, so subsequent presidents would not have to "reinvent the wheel." The task force was made up of the Executive Committee (Minister, President, and President-Elect), the Assistant Treasurer, and a member of the Stewardship Team. Together, they developed a process and budget that is in use again this year.

Operating Budget Process

This year's Operating Budget Committee is made up of the Executive Committee (Rev. Karen, me, and Charlie McNulty), Assistant Treasurer Derek Peterson, and the Stewardship Team's John Mathis. The committee is using last year's spreadsheet and inputting the updated figures for expenses (known and projected) and income (known and projected). The various teams and committees of JRUUC were asked to provide budget requests and expected income (where applicable) to me, and I passed them along to the committee. Karen talked with each staff person to discuss budgets and compensation and brought those figures to the committee.

Pledge Cards Inform the Operating Budget

The committee talked about what an ideal target figure would be for the Annual Budget Drive, and what might be pared back or eliminated from the budget if needed. Once the pledge numbers come in via completed pledge cards (from the Cottage

Meetings and from the mailing to those who could not attend a Cottage Meeting), the committee will meet again to weigh pledges and projected budget. Then, the Board of Trustees will review the budget before the Congregational Meeting on May 15, when members will be asked to vote to pass the budget.

We the 350 7 PM Saturday, April 2nd First Unitarian Society

We the 350 is a narrative performance based on interviews done with Black Wisconsin residents about their experiences as living in some of the most racially segregated (Milwaukee) and racially disparate (Madison) cities in the country.

The performance paints a compelling picture of what the intersections between racism, poverty, and disparate incarceration rates for Wisconsin's Black population look like in someone's daily life. We the 350 explores the ways that state structures rely on intersections between race and class, along with many other intersections, to maintain racially disparate arrest and incarceration rates in Wisconsin.

Tickets are \$10 for adults, \$5 for students ages 14 and up. The show will be performed in the Landmark Auditorium; seating is limited.

Our youth are very excited to share with you a worship service they've helped to create with Rev Karen on Sunday April 3rd. You don't want to miss it!



Updates from MOSES

JRUUC is a congregational member of MOSES -- an interfaith coalition working to increase justice in our state. From numerous angles we are working to decrease the Wisconsin prison population -- and advocate for other change in Wisconsin, too.

WISDOM recently announced that Jerome Dillard will start as the statewide organizer for EXPO (EX-Prisoners Organizing) on April 1st. Mr. Dillard has more than 20 years of experience working with formerly-incarcerated people, and with people in prison. He is a founder of Voices Beyond Bars in Madison, has worked for the Wisconsin Department of Corrections, and most recently has worked as the director of re-entry programs for Dane County.

Stewardship Stirrings

Endowment Fund: From Dreams to Reality

As you probably know by now, we will hold a vote at the Congregation Meeting in May on an amendment to the bylaws that establishes and discusses how the endowment will be managed. Note that the endowment already exists due to at least two generous donors in the last two years, but this amendment formalizes its creation and structure.

We have held two forums already discussing the endowment resolution and will hold one more. Whether or not you can make the forums, your feedback is welcome and desired. An explanation of an Endowment Fund can be found at this link: http://www.jruuc.org/endowment. The "Enabling Resolution" that will be voted on is here: http://www.jruuc.org/endowment-amendment. The bylaws have also been modified to reflect current practices and make them easier to read, as well as including a statement establishing the Endowment Fund. These can be found here: http://www.jruuc.org/2016-congregational-meeting.

So far, we have got great feedback on the endowment amendments to the bylaws. In our first meeting, someone raised the question of why the Board of Trustees chooses the members of the endowment committee rather than having a congregational vote on the committee members. Either way is consistent with what other UU congregations do. After discussing with the nominating committee, the Board of Trustees, and the minister, we decided to leave it as is, since the Board has the fiduciary responsibility for the congregation. At the second meeting, it was suggested that the "Policies and Procedures" document for the endowment committee should specify how the fund is invested. We have edited the Endowment Fund Resolution to add a statement to this effect.

Our next forum will be held April 24 after service. This one will cover the proposed by-laws amendments as well as the endowment. We hope you can make it, and if not, feel free to contact any of the members of the Endowment committee with your comments. We would be happy to meet with you. Also if you would like hard copies of the materials, we can make those available too.
