Connections

November has come and gone, and in its wake there is tension and fear for some, and elation and righteousness for others. Many believe that freedom and democracy are deeply wounded in our nation, while many others think we've elected a savior. Regardless of our opinions, it's a reality that hate crimes have increased dramatically since the election, and that fear is palpable in many communities – for our neighbors, and for members of our own community.

I want to remind you that we know how to support each other and our wider community. We ground ourselves in our faith tradition, in worship, in conversation, in Covenant Groups, through our Caring Tree, in Religious Exploration, and in conversations with me. We've been educating ourselves about race and class. We've been providing Black Lives Matter signs and buttons so we can show our neighbors of color our support. We've been participating in community events that promote the cause of equity and justice.

I'm offering sharing circles for the next few weeks, to give us a place to sit and breathe together, and share the stories of how we're coping with the anxieties of this time. And, as part of our wider ministry, several Reebers and I are heading to Standing Rock this weekend to answer the call to an Interfaith Day of Prayer. I hope you'll send your best wishes – and your donations – with us.

The Minister's Discretionary Fund is another way I can help Reebers and community members in need. If you're moved to donate to the Fund, please bring your checkbook to the Christmas Eve service, as that evening's offering will replenish it – or send me your donation before the end of the month.

I think the most radical and effective thing we can do to make our community safe for ourselves and our neighbors is to show up with open hearts and open minds. And I think the best way to be ready to do that is to stay centered, and keep reaching out. When you need someone to be with, to cry with, to rage with, and to plan with – reach out to me, and to each other, and we'll do it together. And when you see that someone is in need, reach out to them. Navigating these times is going to be hard. Know that, however you're feeling, you're not alone.

Children's Religious Education

December is a busy month for Religious Education at JRUUC!

I am excited for all of the upcoming events and activities! We will start the month with a multigenerational service December 4th. Additionally, this month we will be distributing Guest at Your Table Boxes. Guest at Your Table is an annual fundraising and education program that supports UUSC's human rights work. This year's Guest at Your Table highlights the empowerment of refugees and displaced peoples. Pick up your box Sunday!

We will continue to have regular RE classes for December 11^{th} and 18^{th} and have the children all together on December 25^{th} to do a service activity to celebrate the holiday.

As we near the end of the year, the RE Committee and I are looking for teachers and assistants for the spring semester. We are moving towards having the children's RE match the adult service. This means you will be on the same page as the children in the congregation. Our hope is that this fosters more multigenerational communication and allows parents to engage their children on these themes in a meaningful way. With this new concentration on themes, we are also changing how we are doing the teacher scheduling. Ideally from a consistency standpoint for our children we will have someone sign up for a theme. The themes run for an average of three Sundays. However, we do understand that a commitment of three weeks in a row might be difficult for some and will not work for everyone.
