October Theme: What does it mean to be a people of courage?

“Our word 'courage' comes from the French word coeur, 'heart.' Courage is a willingness to act from the heart, to let your heart lead the way, not knowing what will be required of you next, and if you can do it.” -- Jean Shinoda Bolen

Dear Ones, I'm going to tell you a little secret. I've been dreading this month ever since I learned the theme would be courage. I have not been feeling courageous. In the barrage of daily attacks on people – non-white people, immigrant people, women, transgender people, Muslim people – I have been feeling small and frightened and beaten down. And in the face of personal and collective tragedies, I have been feeling helpless and inadequate. I expected to enter this church year with my capacity to hold the fear and hurt and anger that have become part of our daily conversation since the national election last fall mostly restored. I expected that my courage would return, and it frightens me that I cannot feel it in this time.

And then I remember. Courage doesn't come from feeling strong, but from taking action despite feeling small and scared. The Quaker activist and songwriter, Carrie Newcomer, wrote “Courage doesn't always shout but whispers and reminds, when we get up one more morning and we try another time.” Courage has not left me; rather, I have forgotten how it works. It doesn't just move me to engage in acts of witness, of sympathy, of forgiveness. It is something I learn to feel, over and over again, as I engage those acts with an open heart and in the company of others who are also afraid.

I was asked recently to share the story of my name change. Many of you know that I'm the daughter of German immigrants, and that my connection to my family of origin is tenuous at best. And so, when I decided not to keep Paul's name after our divorce, I chose not to reclaim my family name. Instead, I've found a different way, one that might remind me of courage: Armina is a German name that means “warrior maiden.”

We'll remember courage, together.

Financial Update

August 2017

Income	\$11,521
Expenses	\$15,083

Yes, that's right: income is behind expenses. That's typical for this time of year; many folks fulfill their pledges by check rather than automatic withdrawal and tend to delay somewhat in writing those checks. We have the cash on hand to cover these expenses, but please submit your pledge check as soon as convenient. No: before then, please.

Actually, there is a financial problem that we must keep in mind throughout the year. In May we passed an annual budget in deficit by a large amount (\$14,142!) despite careful planning by a stingy Board of Trustees. Paying our staff properly dominated their thinking, as we agreed it should. That deficit has since been drastically reduced by the amazing generosity of many congregants. With some additional pledges, the total increased by an amazing \$6,153. Furthermore, we will refinance our loan with Park Bank, reducing our monthly payments and saving about \$2,900 for the fiscal year. That leaves a projected deficit of about \$5,600, one-third of the original estimate.

Fortunately, in previous years we had surpluses of income over expenses, so we have adequate funds to cover the projected deficit for this year (through June). We will try very hard to have a balanced budget for the coming year. We really appreciate the generosity shown by our congregants, putting their hard-earned treasure to work for a better congregation and world.

President's Column

It seems like every year we find ourselves having a “congregational conversation” and this year is no different! Our Sanctuary Task Force has been actively participating in Madison’s “New

Sanctuary Movement” which aims to both protect those fighting deportation and also to bring light to the injustice that immigrant families face in our community. As part of that work, they’re diligently and comprehensively studying the different ways that JRUUC can be a part of this movement, in keeping with our resolution of May 2017 to stand in solidarity with immigrants.

This work has included recruiting JRUUC members to help serve the needs of this community directly, in addition to determining the feasibility of JRUUC as a host-site for an individual or couple facing deportation. In order to host a family our building would need some modifications and in keeping with our bylaws, a vote of the congregation is required for those modifications.

The Board of Trustees has resolved that four conditions must be met before the Board of Trustees will consider calling a special congregational meeting in order to vote on becoming a “Sanctuary Congregation”. Those four conditions are:

- 1) A preliminary report of the fact-finding efforts of the Sanctuary Committee
- 2) Small-group “cottage meetings” centered on discussing our role in the movement
- 3) A congregational presentation on a Sunday following service
- 4) A formal recommendation by the Sanctuary Committee to move ahead with a vote

After those conditions have been met, the Board of Trustees will act expeditiously to vote on whether to call a special congregational meeting in accordance with the notice requirements of our bylaws. So, please (please!) attend a cottage meeting, keep an eye out for the Sanctuary Report, and participate in this conversation in whatever ways you can. We really need to hear the voice of our entire community in this discussion!

Update from the Sanctuary Task Force

September opened with a service on Labor Day around the issue of Sanctuary. Sergio Gonzalez, one of the founders of the Dane Sanctuary Coalition, gave a wonderful overview of the history of sanctuary over the last few decades in the US, as well as the current need for sanctuary right here in Dane County. JRUUC became a member of the Dane Sanctuary Coalition back in May when we voted to become a supporting congregation. The Dane Sanctuary Coalition is currently building a network of volunteers from among its 36 member congregations who will be ready to support the individuals who will take sanctuary at one of the sanctuary congregation in the network. We have had several dozen Reebers sign up already. Thank you! "Change" Is a World on Wheels

“If we could change ourselves, the tendencies in the world would also change.” —Mahatma Gandhi

Every Sunday morning, the church choir and I spend time in reflection and silence before we begin the first worship service. I often offer my thoughts on the day's theme or the state of the world, providing context to the message we bring.

On a recent Sunday, I said to the choir, “So often, we make the mistake of living according to our hopes instead of according to our realities.” I didn't mean to say it, and I didn't know that I would. But as I did, the statement became immediately true.

I wonder if, in our efforts to “be the change we wish to see in the world,” we stop short at our ideal selves: the idea of ourselves we are most comfortable with. I wonder how often I think *I've already been the change* — and I'm waiting idly for the tendencies of the world to catch up. I'm unsettled by how frequently I'm surprised by my own social idiocy. How many times need I screw up the same person's preferred pronouns, or note that I am not surprised that the person who just nearly ran me off the road is of a certain race and/or age, or make immediate assumptions about someone because of what I perceive to be their class?

Or maybe this is a better question: How many times do I need to make mistakes at the expense of other people, or people's groups, before I'm ready to admit that I'm not any better at this than the bigoted and willfully ignorant?

I am liberal. Often painfully so. I am not enlightened. I am not elevated. I am not better. But I believe, with everything I am, that I *can* be.

“Change” is a word on wheels. It's not a destination, but a journey. If I am to “be change,” I must commit to humility and refuse to settle for my own comforting achievements.
