Hymn of the Month: "Joy" by Beautiful Chorus

Beautiful Chorus is best known for the musical mantras they create to aid in meditation and relaxation. I first encountered one of their mantras on Instagram and was struck by the beauty and power of its simplicity. I've been wanting to include their music more regularly in Worship and thought our Hymn of the Month would be a great introduction to their work. While reading more about the group I learned that its founder, Alexandra Love, grew up in Wisconsin. Alexandra moved to Orlando, FL after college to sing with a hip hop group and created Beautiful Chorus for a one time performance of original songs in 2011. After that performance, Alexandra knew she wanted to continue singing in the community she created. Based in Orlando, Beautiful Chorus creates digital content, performs live, hosts spiritual conversations, and released a full-length album in July 2024. Their mantra on Joy is:

This year we won't be pricing each item individually, but will be asking buyers to consider what the item is worth to them and pay what they can. From Kirsten Johnson: On **Sunday May 4** some friends and I are having a party to celebrate spring! Please join us if you can.

Location: Dane County Lake Farm Park Shelter #2, 4330 Libby Road, Madison. Note there is limited parking, so biking or car-pooling is encouraged. There is additional parking by shelter #3.

When: Sunday May 4, from 2 pm to 9 pm. Come at any time.

Please Bring: A dish to share (labeled with your name), drinks as desired (note alcohol is allowed), chair (also labeled). Dress for the weather, but with spring in mind – and be prepared to dance. You may want to bring something for the Beltane altar – fresh flowers, something representing fertility, or an item to give away so it becomes a community exchange. Friends and family are welcome, but please carpool. Dogs must be on leash.

Mutual Aid Raffle for Raghad Madi

Yasmine Jawdat's niece, Raghad Madi, is a kind and intelligent young woman displaced in Deir al-Balah with her parents and her 5 younger brothers. Raghad turned 18 on April 18. But there isn't much to celebrate in Gaza, as she and her loved ones suffer from forced starvation and constant bombings. Her family's home in Jabalia is completely destroyed. Raghad's education has been put on pause, making it impossible for her to pursue her dreams. Her one respite is the Gaza sea.

In order to bring Raghad some hope on her Golden Birthday, Jennifer Hedstrom has organized a raffle with the goal of raising at least \$1800 for her family. There are 18 prizes including work by local artists, gift cards to local businesses, handmade jewelry, records, and more.

Be Part of Your UUA's Social Witness Processes!

The <u>UUA Commission on Social Witness</u> oversees the collective social witness process among Unitarian Universalist Association member congregations and groups. Their mission is to amplify emerging social action, promote connections, and nurture accountable social witness across the Association. They facilitate two different types of social witness statements: Statements of Conscience (SOCs), which arise from Congregational Study/Action Issues (CSAIs), and Actions of Immediate Witness (AIWs).

Congregation Study/Action Items:

Three proposed CSAIs passed the congregational vote, so they will be admitted to the agenda for the UUA General Assembly 2025. The three moving forward are:

- Housing: Diversity, Equity and Inclusion, Thursday, April 10
- Fat Liberation: Building Justice and Liberation for Large Bodies, Thursday, April 17
- Abolition As Faith Formation, Tuesday, April 22

The next stage of this process is that we will hold on-line, zoom feedback sessions so congregants from across the country can join in to hear more about each of the CSAIs and offer comments and feedback. The dates of the Feedback Sessions are next to each of the CSAIs and the zoom links will be published soon!

<u>Learn About</u> Congregational Study Action Issues and <u>the process for 2024-2025</u>.

Actions of Immediate Witness:

There's lots to take action about these days. If you want UU's across the country to support your justice efforts, consider submitting an AIW for this year's General Assembly.

March 18: Submission for draft AIWs opens. Any AIWs submitted between March 18th and April 12th will receive CSW feedback. This allows submitters to get feedback about whether they meet criteria, and an opportunity to revise if needed.

After April 12: any submissions after April 12th will continue through the process only if they meet all the criteria without revision.

Friday, May 12 – Deadline for proposed AIWs. These will be posted and distributed to congregations. Details can be found here.
